THIS WEEK'S FOCUS: THE BENEFITS OF THE AP PROGRAM

AP Success Stories (Continued)

In December, Ms. van Keulen invited every educator to join the school's Advanced Placement Committee and enter into an ongoing conversation about the AP program in our school.

The majority of the educators that met agree with the College Board's definition of success, "an AP exam grade of 3 or higher, which represents the score point that research finds predictive of college success and college graduation."

Most of the AP teachers present recognize the need for our students to grow more competitive as future college applicants and then to excel in future academic pursuits; therefore, greater student exposure to AP level classes is a desired goal.

Our AP teachers shared through a survey more information regarding these specialized classes, such as their belief that students who would like to take AP classes must be equipped

with the skills and qualities listed below before registering for the class:

- a desire to be challenged
- good writing skills, which include note-taking skills and the ability to write research papers
- willingness to work hard (30-45 minutes per day to study that subject alone)
- reading comprehension at an adequate level
- willingness to thoroughly understand concepts rather than merely memorizing rules
- a solid knowledge of English grammar and syntax

The CFI Team will continue to work with departments to support an even greater emphasis on developing the skills and qualities listed above, focusing in particular on the following: note-taking, conceptual understanding, writing in the classroom, a research paper, and a final term thesis paper. Students will then be even better prepared for AP and

college classes.

The AP teachers unanimously agreed that with more students taking AP classes, the student population with which they are working is more diverse in skills; this necessitates time-intensive work to differentiate instruction, to plan, to implement highly challenging lessons, and to give students meaningful feedback. Ideas were shared, each of which will be considered by the school for the next academic year.

LaGuardia intends to organize an AP Fair this year that will enhance student awareness and understanding of Advanced Placement classes. Once our young people comprehend the extent to which these rigorous courses can benefit them while also comprehending the considerable challenge they present, students will be better able to make informed decisions about scheduling for the year ahead.

Preparing for the Renaissance and Baroque Festival

Celebrating the advancements of the Renaissance and Baroque periods at the school-wide level encourages us to come together and meet students' needs as a community, discovering commonalities among disciplines in the process. Indeed, The LaGuardia Arts Renaissance and Baroque Festival may provide scaffolding for future interdisciplinary work. Every department is involved with the fair, and some plans overlap.

The English Department will celebrate The Festival by analyzing literature from the Renaissance and Baroque time periods. Ninth grade students will either continue to learn about Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream* or will study a Renaissance theme, poet, artist, or composer. Some tenth grade students

will compare a Renaissance poet, composer, or artist to one from the Harlem Renaissance; others may consider how a literary renaissance is defined and connect Renaissance and Baroque poets with writers of the Harlem Renaissance. Eleventh grade students will study a Shakespearean text, such as *Hamlet* or *Macbeth*. Twelfth grade students will explore a Renaissance artist, composer, painter, sculptor, or writer.

The Foreign Language Department will also study the Renaissance and Baroque periods with enthusiasm, focusing on several facets of those rich times. Students will learn about famous paintings and background information about the artists. Some will compare Renaissance and contemporary art. Other students will learn

about linguistic changes that took place, philosophical developments of the time, or the spirit of exploration that led to the discovery of the Americas.

Like the English Department and the Foreign Language Department, the Social Studies Department will help students to understand how these exciting times still matter in the twenty-first century. For example, some students in Global 2 will complete a Renaissance Project. This project involves each young person choosing an artistic masterpiece from the Renaissance and then creating his or her own original masterpiece in a similar style. Students will present their Renaissance-inspired creations to their classmates on the day of the Festival.
