THIS WEEK'S FOCUS: USING TECHNOLOGY TO FURTHER INSTRUCTION

Technology has saved LaGuardia's teachers time and helped them become more effective The benefits certainly extend to educators. students: The use of Smart Board presentations, Web Quests, and class forums can bring a new group of students into the sphere of success. We are aware of the increasingly important role that technology plays in education; unfortunately, to some of us, new programs and machinery are more enervating than empowering. In order to support all teachers, LaGuardia named as a school-wide goal an increase in faculty use of technology: Teachers often use new instructional techniques in the classroom, and we are eager to provide educators the support they need to introduce some of those involving technology. Please read on to learn about LaGuardia's plans for the year ahead.

LaG Teachers Go Online!

More educational material is available online to students and teachers than ever before. Following our professional development sessions, over sixty LaGuardia teachers have created classjump.com course Web sites, and additional educators have pages on different **servers**. Many students and parents can now easily access class assignments, rubrics, and texts at their convenience. Some of our teachers have even created Web forums in which students can discuss course material with each other.

Program Office Web Site

LaGuardia's technological advances will give teachers **unprecedented** access to helpful information that will facilitate cross-curricular work. Our new laguardiaartsprogramoffice.org Web site should soon feature a Curricular Calendar that a teacher can access to see what educators in different departments are teaching. This will make **interdisciplinary** collaboration easier than ever. In addition, our Expertise Reference Grid will enable teachers to identify colleagues with interests in a particular area who may be willing to visit a class or **collaborate**.

Visitors to the Program Office Web site will have access to even more information. This includes the following: CFI Team resources, *The LaGuardia Scholastic Guide*, academic sequencing calendars, programming calendars, an online proctoring application, Yellow Sheet articles, memos, letters, forms, testing documents, and more.

Several LaGuardia teachers will likely soon participate in team research projects designed to help students improve performance. These Teacher Teams will upload the results of their inquiries via the Web-based system that we developed. We will publish the findings of these studies online. Other LaGuardia educators will likely share research results with our school community in this fashion in the future.

Making Technology Accessible

Technology is only helpful if people know how to make use of it, and that is why LaGuardia is offering several professional development training sessions. These have been well received in past

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years, and we expect that **faculty** members will once again take advantage of these teacherled workshops in order to further their students' learning. The school expects to train all teaching staff and guidance counselors to utilize Daedalus to track student achievement, for example. This will minimize paper use by allowing teachers to check information about students online and also communicate with students and parents online. Some of these professional development opportunities will be made available on a schoolwide level; others, including a workshop involving Web site creation, will be offered after school.

Learning From Colleagues

Teacher-led professional development sessions will not be educators' only opportunity to learn from colleagues. One teacher in each department will act as technology **liaison**. In addition, educators will schedule inter-visitations to include the observation of lessons that utilize technology.

Support and Maintenance

The school hired an additional supervisory service technician. In addition, we just purchased three new servers to address the needs of an increasing number of computers working in the school. If you were to have difficulty with our improved network, help would be a mere phone call away.
