REQUESTING CLASSES ONLINE

STUDENTS: Apply for classes at laguardiaartsprogramoffice.org!

Have you applied for classes yet? Please bear in mind that your preference will receive consideration only if your online request is completed by **11:59PM on May 17th**. If you still need to apply, carefully follow the step below:

- All students must first go to the Program Office Web Site at laguardiaartsprogramoffice.org and review all instructions. This interface will direct you to Daedalus.
- 2. Use your Daedalus log-in information to access the course application system.
- 3. If applicable, you may selective certain courses.

This new automated course request system is comparable to those already in place in colleges and other high schools of our caliber.

You received your Daedalus log-in information and the URL of the site where you can apply, **laguardiaartsprogramoffice.org**, with your report card in OP on Monday, May 11th.

If you request an AP or honors class in Daedalus and are directed to place your name on a waiting list for future evaluation by selecting the class with "WAIT" in its title, consider doing so. Do not despair: Many students from these waiting lists will ultimately be programmed for the courses for which they applied. On June 1, you will receive a list of requested courses; this document will identify the classes for which you have qualified. Take that list of requested classes to your guidance counselor during a lunch period on June 2, 3, 4, or 5 to address questions or concerns.

SCHOLASTIC GUIDE PILOT PROGRAM



Twenty students are acting as reviewers would for *The New York Times Book Review* or *The Economist.* They are reading through LaGuardia's Scholastic Guide and highlighting text that might aid them in their studies. Every time a student highlights text, he or she identifies the page on which the useful information can be found and explains how the text will be helpful. They are also encouraged to offer criticism.

The Guide started as a collaborative project that was produced by teachers from several departments. Other educators later offered feedback about how The Scholastic Guide could be modified to better meet students' needs. Our hope is that student feedback will enable us to further improve the Guide so that when it is released next year students will refer to it regularly.
